Why we want you

What you will be doing

- Advertising the support group (posters, leaflets, etc.)
- Attending the weekly support group sessions, arriving early to set up the room and liaising with Café staff.
- Setting the meeting agenda agreed upon by the whole group
- Leading the support group discussion
- Signposting to other support, professionals, organisations etc
- Welcoming new members
- Liaising with other volunteers to ensure there is a volunteer present for the duration of the meeting
- Accompanying group members in local outings
- Organising speakers to come to the group
- Attending monthly branch committee meetings to give any PAAG updates

The skills you need

- Knowledge and experience of the autism spectrum is an advantage but not essential as we can provide training
- Patience and understanding of the needs of others



- Approachable and ability to facilitate the group discussion so that everyone feels included
- Confident in taking the lead at introducing themselves and speaking to new people attending the group
- Researching topics related to autism and the groups' interests
- An ability to make new people feel welcome
